
Sarah Stevenson, Life member and past president (1980-1984 and 1994-1998) of the Charlotte Club:

Greensboro Club President, Yardley Hunter, was recognized November 11th, by the Bennett College Durham Alumnae Association as a recipient of one of their "Women of Vision Awards of Excellence and Veteran Leadership", and part of the alumnae chapter's 26th annual White Breakfast fundraising event, in conjunction to celebrating Bennett College's 90th Anniversary as a women's college.

The award also recognized President Hunter for 21 years as a military veteran. A retired USAF Captain, President Hunter adds to her list of military experiences being the only Black female officer, in a 12 officer cadre, selected by the Air Force to train the first class with females in the USAF Academy Class of 1980.

President Hunter is a 1975 Bennett graduate, as well as her Class Reunion Coordinator. A charter member of the 1926 Club—donors giving the college's founding year amount in financial support—President Hunter was highlighted for her continuous dedication to her alumnae and her life long service in promoting women empowerment in the community.
